Dear Sir:

This letter is in reference to the Trinity River EIS. While I support the preferred alternative, it does not provide sufficient water for the Trinity River. Trinity River Act of 1955, authorizing the dams, specifically mandated that the fish and wildlife of the basin not be harmed. The Interior Secretary was directed to ensure that fish and wildlife in the basin were protected. However, since the dams were completed in 1963, water diversions led to a nearly 90 percent decline in the fisheries by the early 1990's. The coho salmon now is listed under the Endangered Species Act, and steelhead are a candidate for listing.

Two decades of study and scientific evidence have given us the needed information to make a good decision for the Trinity. While the science and study that produced the Flow Evaluation Report are sound, the recommendations were limited by an assumption about the amount of water that could be available for the river. However, more water can be made available since the legislation creating the Trinity River Division, and later legislation, clearly gives Trinity fish and wildlife priority over the diversion of any water to the CVP.

Continued funding for mechanical restoration projects is at best unreliable, and little evidence supports that these measures are effective mitigation for reduced flows. We need more than the 48 percent of the annual watershed runoff prescribed in the Preferred Alternative to ensure that the river will have sufficient flows to restore Trinity's fisheries and wildlife as prescribed by law. The preferred alternative does not go far enough in providing sufficient flows; more water should be returned to the Trinity River.


The Trinity River and its restoration program are completely independent of the CALFED process. Restoration of the Trinity River is mandated in the 1955 legislation authorizing construction of the Trinity River Division, the Trinity River Basin Fish and Wildlife Management Act of 1984, and the Central Valley Project Improvement Act (CVPIA). The CVPIA reaffirms the Trinity's unique position within the Central Valley Project (CVP) and clearly sets forth that restoration of the Trinity is to be considered independently from other California water issues.

The federal government's trust obligations to two Native American Tribes has gone unfulfilled for more than 36 years because of excessive water diversions from the Trinity River. The time has come for the federal government to begin fulfilling its legally mandated responsibilities to the Hoopa Valley and Yurok Tribes.

Dear Joe Polos,

I am writing to you regarding the Trinity River Mainstem Fisheries Restoration Environmental Impact Statement and Report (EIS/R) which addresses flow diversions from the Trinity River. The Preferred Alternative advocated by this EIS/R still allows over half the water to be diverted from the basin, keeping only 48 percent in the river. However, recent studies have determined that a river needs at least 70 percent of its flow to maintain a healthy fishery, and a separate Trinity River Flow Evaluation Report also recommended higher flow rates than advocated in the EIS/R.

The Trinity River Act of 1955, which authorized the construction of the Trinity and Lewiston Dams, specifically mandated that the fish and wildlife of the basin not be harmed by flow diversions. This act and more recent legislation gives Trinity fish and wildlife priority over the diversion of any water to the Central Valley Project. However, the available data suggest that number of anadromous fish returning to the river by the early 1990's had declined by as much as 80 to 90 percent since construction of the dams.

It is obvious from this information that flow diversions have had a tremendous negative impact on fish populations in the river and violate the legislation that allowed for their initiation. Not only do the fish and wildlife in the basin have priority over the diversion of water, but they are also a much more valuable resource to the State of California than the crops that are grown in the western San Joaquin Valley using Trinity River water. A restored Trinity River will provide an enormous boost to the sport fishing, rafting, and tourism economies of Northern California and Southern Oregon.

The federal government's promise to maintain a healthy fishery in the Trinity River has been disregarded for the last 36 years, and past legislation mandated a flow decision by the end of 1996. The time has come to face the reality of the current situation. The federal government is disregarding its own legislation that was put in place to protect the fish and wildlife in the Trinity Basin from the kind of degradation that has occurred since 1963. I advocate the retention of 70 percent of the water in the Trinity River basin, and believe that any flow diversions greater than those recommended in the Trinity River Flow Evaluation Report would be irresponsible and show a lack of regard for the fish and wildlife that you are charged with protecting.

Dear EIS/EIR Team Members:

I have been reading about water flow issues in the Trinity River Basin. My understanding is that the Trinity River Division may adopt a plan (the Preferred Alternative) to divert a significantly large (in excess of 30%) of the natural water flow in the Basin. I'm concerned that insufficient water will be available at critical times to support and restore the ecosystem. I'm especially concerned about negative effects of such a plan on populations of already endangered or threatened salmon and trout.

The Trinity River Act of 1955, authorizing the existing dams, specifically mandated that the fish and wildlife of the basin not be harmed. The Interior Secretary was directed to ensure that fish and wildlife in the basin were protected. However, the dams and associated water diversions have led to a nearly 90 percent decline in the Trinity's fisheries. Sad, but readily reversible by sound water management in which the fisheries have survival-level priority. Again, if the proposed plan does not guarantee restoration of this once vital fishery, then it is obviously not the Preferred Alternative.



Dear Mr. Polos:

Implementation of the recommendations of the Trinity River flow evaluation study could reverse nearly four decades of bad faith with the people of California. It is also a test case for those of us who are looking cautiously at the assurances being proposed for the CALFED Bay/Delta Program.

Restoration efforts in the Trinity River watershed have made it clear that fish respond better to water than to money. The science based, rather than politically based, approach to river flows is essential to a restored river with a robust fishery.

Questions remain as to the adequacy of the recommended flows. Monitoring and continuing evaluation of the flows, geomorphologic effects, salmon response in all life stages, steelhead response in all life stages, invertebrate response, avian response, and other wildlife effects must condition an adaptive protocol for determining and implementing optimum stream flows.
