shoemaker Valley [COLUSA]: canyon, 1 mile long, 12 miles north of Wilbur Springs (lat. 39°12'55" N, long. 122°26' W). Named on Wilbur Springs (1961) 15' quadrangle.

Shotgun Lake [NEVADA]: lake, 1000 feet long, 3.25 miles southwest of English Mountain along South Fork Canyon Creek (lat. 39° 25'20" N, long. 120°36'15" W; on W line sec. 14, T 18 N, R 12 E). Named on English Mountain (1983) 7.5' quadrangle.

Shower Branch [SIERRA]: stream, flows 2.25 miles to Canyon Creek 6 miles west-northwest of Goodyears Bar (lat. 39°34'55" N, long. 120°59' W; near E line sec. 20, T 20 N, R 9 E). Named on Goodyears Bar (1951)

7.5' quadrangle.

Showers Lake [EL DORADO]: lake, 750 feet long, 3.25 miles northeast of Kirkwood (lat. 38°44'30" N, long. 120°02'05" W; on E line sec. 6, T 10 N, R 18 E). Named on Caples Lake (1979) 7.5' quadrangle.

Shriner Lake [AMADOR]: lake, 750 feet long, 3.5 miles west of Mokelumne Peak (lat. 38°32'10" N, long. 120°09'30" W; on N line sec. 24, T 8 N, R 16 E). Named on Bear River Reservoir (1979) 7.5' quadrangle.

Shrub [EL DORADO]: locality, 2.5 miles north-northeast of Latrobe along Southern Pacific Railroad (lat. 38°35'30" N, long. 120°57'10" W; sec. 35, T 9 N, R 9 E). Named on Latrobe (1949) 7.5' quadrangle.

Shuckman Canyon [COLUSA]: canyon, 1 mile long, 7 miles north of Wilbur Springs (lat. 39°08'15" N, long. 122°23'40" W; near NE cor. sec. 22, T 15 N. R 5 W). Named on Wilbur Springs (1961) 15' quadrangle.

Sicard Flat [YUBA]: locality, 3 miles west-northwest of Smartville (lat. 39°13'55" N, long. 121°20'40" W; sec. 19, T 16 N, R 6 E); the place is nearly 1 mile north of Yuba River. Named on Smartville (1951) 7.5' quadrangle. The name commemorates Theodore Sicard, a French sailor who mined and traded at the place in 1848 (Gudde, 1949, p. 330). Sicard Flat was the name given to the community that developed about a mile back from Sicard's Bar on Yuba River (Hoover, Rensch, and Rensch, p. 589).

Sicard's Bar: see Sicard Flat [YUBA]. Sierra: see Sierra City [SIERRA].

Sierra Buttes [SIERRA]: relief feature, multiple peaks 2 miles north-northwest of Sierra City along a northwest-trending ridge (lat. 39°35'30" N, long. 120°38'20" W). Named on Sierra City (1981) 7.5' quadrangle. Called Yuba Butte on Goddard's (1857) map.

Sierra Campground [SIERRA]: locality, 6 miles northeast of Sierra City along North Yuba River (lat. 39°37'50" N, long. 120°33'30" W; at N line sec. 6, T 20 N, R 13 E). Named on Clio (1981) 7.5' quadrangle.

Sierra City [SIERRA]: village, 10.5 miles east of Downieville along North Yuba River (lat. 39°34' N, long. 120°38' W; at S line sec. 28, T 20 N, R 12 E). Named on Sierra City (1981) 7.5' quadrangle. Postal authorities established Sierra post office in 1855, discontinued in it 1856, reestablished it with the name "Sierra City" in 1864, discontinued it in 1865, and reestablished it in 1867 (Salley, p. 204). Kane Flat, also known as Buttes Flat, is at the west end of Sierra City; it was the site of a stamp mill for Sierra Buttes mine (Gudde, 1975, p. 182).

Sierra de San Marcos: see "Regional setting."

Sierra House [EL DORADO]: locality, 5 miles northwest of Freel Peak (lat. 38°54'25" N, long. 119°57'50" W; near NW cor. cor. sec. 11, T 12 N, R 18 E). Site named on South Lake Tahoe (1955) 7.5' quadrangle.

Sierra Nevada: see "Regional setting."

Sierra Valley [SIERRA]: valley, extends north and northeast from Sierraville into Plumas County. Named on Antelope Valley (1981), Calpine (1981), Loyalton (1981), Sattley (1981), and Sierraville (1981) 7.5' quadrangles.

Sierra Valley: see Sierraville [SIERRA].

Sierra Valley Channels [SIERRA]: water feature, braided streams that extend from the south part of Sierra Valley north into Plumas County, where they enter marsh. Named on Antelope Valley (1981) and Calpine (1981) 7.5' quadrangles. United States Board on Geographic Names (1974b, p. 3) noted that the feature is a network of ditches and drains that converge in Plumas County at the head of Middle Fork Feather River—the Board gave the variant name "Middle Fork Feather River" for Sierra Valley Channels.

Sierraville [SIERRA]: village, 25 miles east of Downieville (lat. 39° 35'20" N, long. 120°22' W; sec. 13, T 20 N, R 14 E); the place is at the south end of Sierra Valley. Named on Sierraville (1981) 7.5' quadrangle. Postal authorities established Sierra Valley post office in 1862 and changed the

name to Sierraville in 1899 (Frickstad, p. 185). Sierraville Creek [SIERRA]: stream, formed by the confluence of Bonita Creek and Cold Stream (1), flows less than 1 mile to Sierra Valley 1.25 miles south of Sierraville (lat. 39°34'20" N, long. 120° 21'55" W; sec. 24, T 20 N, R 14 E); the stream goes past Sierraville. Named on Sierraville

Signal Peak [NEVADA]: peak, 4.5 miles east-northeast of Yuba Gap (lat. 39°20'20" N, long. 120°32'05" W; sec. 17, T 17 N, R 13 E). Altitude 7841

feet. Named on Cico Grove (1955) 7.5' quadrangle. Signal Rock [COLUSA]: relief feature, 3.5 miles west-northwest of Wilbur

Springs (lat. 39°03'50" N, long. 122°28'30" W; sec. 13, T 14 N, R 6 W). Named on Wilbur Springs (1961) 15' quadrangle. Sills Lake [SUTTER]: lake, 1250 feet long, 5.25 miles south-southeast of

Meridian (lat. 39°04'25" N, long. 121°52'25" W; on W line sec. 9, T 14 N, R 1 E). Named on Grimes (1954) and Tisdale Weir (1952) 7.5' quadrangles. Silvas Grove [SACRAMENTO]: locality, 3.25 miles west-northwest of downtown Sacramento (lat. 38°36' N, long. 121°32'35" W). Named on Lovdal

(1916) 7.5' quadrangle.

Silverado: see Camp Silverado [AMADOR]. Silver Creek [EL DORADO]: stream, heads at Union Valley Reservoir and flows 16 miles to South Fork American River 2 miles north of Pollock Pines (lat. 38°47'20" N, long. 120°35'20" W; sec. 24, T 11 N, R 12 E). Named on Pollock Pines (1950) and Riverton (1950) 7.5' quadrangles. Jones Fork flows 16 miles to Union Valley Reservoir 6.5 miles northnorthwest of Riverton (near S line sec. 26, T 12 N, R 14 E); it is named on Kyburz (1952), Pyramid Peak (1955), and Rockbound Valley (1955) 7.5'

quadrangles. Kyburz (1952) 7.5' quadrangle shows Jones place situated along Jones Fork (NE cor. sec. 35, T 12 N, R 14 E). Jones Fork has the name "Middle Fork Silver Creek" on Pyramid Peak (1896) 30' quadrangle. South Fork enters Silver Creek 5.5 miles north of Riverton (sec. 30, T 12 N, R 14 E); it is 25 miles long and is named on Kyburz (1952), Pyramid Peak (1955), and Riverton (1950) 7.5' quadrangles.

Silver Creek [PLACER]: stream, flows 2.5 miles to Truckee River 5 miles northwest of Tahoe City (lat. 39°13'30" N, long. 120°12' W; sec. 21, T 16 N, R 16 E); the stream heads near Silver Peak. Named on Tahoe City

(1955) 7.5' quadrangle.

Silver Creek: see Big Silver Creek [EL DORADO]; Deer Creek [PLACER];

Silver Creek Campground [EL DORADO]: locality, nearly 5 miles northeast of Riverton along South Fork Silver Creek (lat. 38°48'55" N, long. 120°22'45" W; sec. 11, T 11 N, R 14 E). Named on Riverton (1950) 7.5' quadrangle.

Silver Creek Campground [PLACER]: locality, 5 miles northwest of Tahoe City along Truckee River (lat. 39°13'25" N, long. 120°12'05" W; sec. 21, T 16 N, R 16 E); the place is near the mouth of Silver Creek. Named on

Tahoe City (1955) 7.5' quadrangle.

Silverdale [YOLO]: locality, 6 miles southwest of Clarksburg along Sacramento Northern Railroad (lat. 38°21'20" N, long. 121°36'05" W). Named on Courtland (1952) 7.5' quadrangle.

Silver Fork: see American River [EL DORADO-PLACER-SACRA-

MENTO].

Silver Fork Meadow [EL DORADO]: area, 4.5 miles west-southwest of Kirkwood (lat. 38°41'30" N, long. 120°09' W); the place is north of Silver Fork American River. Named on Tragedy Spring (1979) 7.5' quadrangle.

Silver Hill [EL DORADO]: peak, 4 miles west-southwest of Robbs Peak (lat. 38°53'55" N, long. 120°28'05" W; sec. 12, T 12 N, R 13 E). Altitude

6081 feet. Named on Robbs Peak (1950) 7.5' quadrangle.

Silver Lake [AMADOR]: lake, 2 miles long, behind a dam 9 miles north of Mokelumne Peak (lat. 38°40'05" N, long. 120°07'15" W; sec. 32, T 10 N, R 17 E). Named on Caples Lake (1979) and Tragedy Spring (1979) 7.5' quadrangles. Postal authorities established Caminettis post office—probably at a resort near Silver Lake—in 1916 and discontinued it in 1920; the name was for for Elizabeth B. Caminetti, first postmaster (Salley, p. 33).

Silver Lake: see Plasse [AMADOR].

Silver Lake West Campground [AMADOR-EL DORADO]: locality, 3.5 miles southwest of Kirkwood (lat. 38°40'20" N, long. 120°07'15" W; sec. 32, T 10 N, R 17 E); the place is north of Silver Lake. Named on Caples Lake (1979) 7.5' quadrangle.

Silver Peak [EL DORADO]: peak, 4.5 miles west-southwest of Phipps Peak (lat. 38°56'05" N, long. 120°13'45" W; sec. 32, T 13 N, R 16 E). Altitude 8930 feet. Named on Rockbound Valley (1955) 7.5' quadrangle.

Silver Peak [PLACER]: peak, 6.5 miles west-northwest of Tahoe City (lat. 39°13'15" N, long. 120°14'45" W; sec. 19, T 16 N, R 16 E). Altitude 8424 feet. Named on Tahoe City (1955) 7.5' quadrangle.

Simmerly Slough [YUBA]: stream, joins Jack Slough 2.5 miles north-northeast of Marysville (lat. 39°10'45" N, long. 121°34'30" W). Named on Honcut (1952) and Yuba City (1952) 7.5' quadrangles.

Simmons Hot Springs: see Wilbur Springs [COLUSA].

Simon Ravine [YUBA]: canyon, drained by a stream that flows 1 mile to Slate Creek 5.25 miles northeast of Strawberry Valley (lat. 39°37' N, long. 121°02'10" W; near SW cor. sec. 1, T 20 N, R 8 E). Named on Strawberry Valley (1948) 7.5' quadrangle.

Simpson Gulch [EL DORADO]: canyon, drained by a stream that flows 2.5 miles to Middle Dry Creek 1.5 miles south-southwest of Caldor (lat. 38°35'05" N, long. 120°26'20" W; sec. 33, T 9 N, R 14 E). Named on

Caldor (1951) 7.5' quadrangle.

Sims: see Runyon, under Franklin [SACRAMENTO].

Singleton Springs [EL DORADO]: springs, 10 miles west-southwest of Kirkwood at the head of North Fork Cosumnes River (lat. 38° 38'15" N, long. 120°14'20" W; near SW cor. sec. 8, T 9 N, R 16 E). Named on Tragedy Spring (1979) 7.5' quadrangle.

Sites [COLUSA]: village, 8 miles west-northwest of Maxwell along Stone Corral Creek (lat. 39°18'30" N, long. 122°20'10" W; sec. 20, T 17 N, R 4 W). Named on Sites (1958) 7.5' quadrangle. Postal authorities established Sites post office in 1887 and discontinued it in 1968 (Salley, p. 205). C.E. Grunsky named the place in 1887 for John H. Sites, a landholder (Gudde, 1949, p. 334).

Sites Spring [COLUSA]: spring, 2 miles southeast of Lodoga (lat. 39°16'45" N, long. 122°28' W; sec. 31, T 17 N, R 5 W). Named on Lodoga (1960)

15' quadrangle.

Sixmile Bar [SACRAMENTO]: shoal, 5 miles northwest of downtown Sacramento in Sacramento River (lat. 38°37'30" N, long. 121°33'40" W). Named on Elkhorn Weir (1915) 7.5' quadrangle.

Six Mile House [EL DORADO]: locality, 5.5 miles east of Placerville (lat. 38°44'15" N, long. 120°41'55" W). Named on Placerville (1893) 30' quad-

rangle.

6 Mile House [SACRAMENTO]: locality, nearly 6 miles north of downtown Sacramento along Linda Creek (Dry Creek (1) of modern maps) (lat. 38°39'30" N, long. 121°29' W). Named on Sacramento (1892) 30' quadrangle.

Six Mile House: see Scotts Flat [NEVADA] (2).

Sixmile Station [YUBA]: locality, 5 miles north of Marysville (lat. 39°13'10" N, long. 121°36' W). Named on Yuba City (1952) 7.5' quadrangle.

Sixmile Valley [PLACER]: valley, 3.5 miles west of Cisco Grove (lat. 39°18'45" N, long. 120°36'15" W; on E line sec. 27, T 17 N, R 12 E). Named on Cisco Grove (1955) 7.5' quadrangle.

Sixteen Mile House: see Princeton [COLUSA].

Skillman Flat [NEVADA]: area, nearly 3 miles south of Washington (lat. 39°19'10" N, long. 120°47'25" W; near SW cor. sec. 19, T 17 N, R 11 E). Named on Washington (1950) 7.5' quadrangle.

Skinners [EL DORADO]: locality, 4.25 miles west-northwest of Shingle Springs (lat. 38°42' N, long. 120°59'40" W; near N line sec. 28, T 10 N, R

9 E). Named on Shingle Springs (1949) 7.5' quadrangle. Skinnerville Spring [COLUSA]: spring, 10 miles north of Wilbur Springs (lat. 39°10'55" N, long. 122°24'50" W; sec. 4, T 15 N, T 5 W). Named on

Wilbur Springs (1961) 15' quadrangle.

Skunk Canyon [EL DORADO]: canyon, 1.5 miles long, opens into the canyon of South Fork American River 4.25 miles south-southwest of the village of Pilot Hill (lat. 38°46'25" N, long. 121°02' W; sec. 25, T 11 N, R 8

E). Named on Pilot Hill (1954) 7.5' quadrangle.

Skunk Canyon [PLACER]: canyon, drained by a stream that flows 1.5 miles to North Fork of Middle Fork American River 1.5 miles south of Michigan Bluff (lat. 39°01'05" N, long. 120°44' W; sec. 34, T 14 N, R 11 E). Named on Michigan Bluff (1952) 7.5' quadrangle. Called Skunk Gulch on Whitney's (1873) map.

Skunk Creek [SACRAMENTO]: stream, flows 12 miles to marsh near Laguna Creek 3.5 miles north of Galt (lat. 38°18'10" N, long. 121°18'30" W). Named on Clay (1968) and Galt (1968) 7.5' quadrangles.

Skunk Gulch: see Skunk Canyon [PLACER].

Skunk Spring [PLACER]: spring, 3.5 miles northwest of Duncan Peak (lat. 39°11'15" N, long. 120°33'50" W; sec. 6, T 15 N, R 13 E). Named on Duncan Peak (1952) 7.5' quadrangle.

Skyhigh [SIERRA]: peak, 2.25 miles south-southwest of Mount Fillmore (lat. 39°42' N, long. 120°51'45" W; sec. 9, T 21 N, R 10 E). Altitude 6443 feet. Named on Mount Fillmore (1951) 7.5' quadrangle.

Skylake Camp [EL DORADO]: locality, 6 miles west-northwest of Freel Peak along Upper Truckee River (lat. 38°54'15" N, long. 119°59'35" W; sec. 9, T 12 N, R 18 E). Named on Freel Peak (1956) 15' quadrangle.

Slab Creek [EL DORADO]: stream, flows 12 miles to South Fork American River 5.5 miles west-northwest of Pollock Pines (lat. 38° 47'15" N, long. 120°41' W; sec. 19, T 11 N, R 12 E). Named on Pollock Pines (1950) and

Slate Mountain (1950) 7.5' quadrangles.

Slab Creek Reservoir [EL DORADO]: lake, behind a dam on South Fork American River 6.25 miles west of Pollock Pines (lat. 38°46'40" N, long. 120°41'50" W; sec. 25, T 11 N, R 11 E); Slab Creek joins South Fork American River in the lake. Named on Slate Mountain (1950, photorevised 1973) 7.5' quadrangle.

Slabtown: see Jackson Butte [AMADOR].

Slacks Ravine [NEVADA]: canyon, drained by a stream that flows 4 miles to Deer Creek 6 miles northwest of Pilot Peak (lat. 39°13'25" N, long. 121°16'20" W; at S line sec. 23, T 16 N, R 6 E). Named on Rough and Ready (1949) and Smartville (1951) 7.5' quadrangles.

Slapjack Creek [YUBA]: stream, flows 3 miles to Indian Creek 3 miles east of Challenge (lat. 39°28'55" N, long. 121°10'05" W; sec. 27, T 19 N, R 7 E). Named on Challenge (1948) and Clipper Mills (1948) 7.5' quadrangles.

Slate Creek [SIERRA-YUBA]: stream, heads in Sierra County and flows 26 miles, partly in Plumas County, to North Yuba River nearly 3 miles south-southeast of Strawberry Valley in Yuba County (lat. 39°31'35" N. long. 121°05'25" W; sec. 9, T 19 N, R 8 E). Named on American House (1948), Blue Nose Mountain (1951), La Porte (1951), Onion Valley (1950), and Strawberry Valley (1948) 7.5' quadrangles. The stream forms part of Sierra-Plumas County line. Slate Range [YUBA]: locality, 4.5 miles south-southeast of Strawberry Valley (lat. 39°30'05" N, long. 121°04'25" W); the place is 1.5 miles south of Slate Range Bar. Named on Bidwell Bar (1897) 30' quadrangle. Borthwick (p. 214) reported stopping at Slate Range House, "so called from being situated at the spot where one begins to descend to Slate Range, a place where the banks of the river are composed of huge masses of slate."

Slate Range Bar [YUBA]: locality, 3.5 miles south-southeast of Strawberry Valley along North Yuba River (lat. 39°31'05" N, long. 121°04'30" W; sec. 15, T 19 N, R 8 E). Sleepy Hollow [PLACER]: canyon, drained by a stream that flows 0.5 mile to Live Oak Ravine 3.5 miles south of Colfax (lat. 39°03'05" N, long. 120°57'45" W; sec. 22, T 14 N, R 9 E). Named on Colfax (1949) 7.5'

Sleighville Creek [SIERRA-YUBA]: stream, heads in Sierra County and flows 1 mile to Williamson Creek nearly 2 miles north-northeast of Camptonville in Yuba County (lat. 39°28'35" N, long. 121° 02'20" W; near NW cor. sec. 36, T 19 N, R 8 E); the stream heads north of Sleighville House. Named on Camptonville (1948) 7.5' quadrangle.

Sleighville House [SIERRA]: locality, 2.25 miles north-northwest of Pike (lat. 39°28'15" N, long. 121°00'35" W; sec. 31, T 19 N, R 9 E). Named on Camptonville (1948) 7.5' quadrangle. Peter Yore built the original structure at the site in 1849; goods were transferred from wagons to sleighs at
